Katie reached the board and picked up a piece of yellow chalk. She opened her mouth to take a deep, calming breath. But instead of breathing in air, she let out a great big belch.




It was the loudest burp she'd ever heard. A real record-breaker.


Quickly, Katie looked down at her body.

"Cool!" Kevin agreed. "It's like a chew-stick mountain."



But Katie wasn't about to be caught in the boys' locker room. She ran for the door.



Was it possible? Had she turned back into herself?



Katie shook her head. "Nope."


"I guess none of the kids are scared of me after today," George moaned.

you Katie Kazoo," he said finally.


Katie grinned. "It's okay. I kind of like it, actually."
